Principal Activity and Review of the Business

The company has been granted charitable status under Sections 207 and 208 of the Taxes Consolidation Act 1997, Charity No 20049119.

There have been no significant changes in the company's activities during the financial year but the company's activities had been negatively impacted during 2021 by the effects of COVID-19.

Principal Risks and Uncertainties

The Directors have identified that the key risks and uncertainties the Charity faces relate to the risk of a decrease in the level of donations and the potential increase in compliance requirements in accordance with company, health and safety, taxation and other legislation.

The charity mitigates these risks as follows:

Statement of compliance

The financial statements of the company for the year ended 31 December 2022 have been prepared accordance with the provisions of FRS 102 Section 1A (Small Entities) and the Companies Act 2014. 3

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the going concern basis and in accordance with the historical cost convention, as explained in the accounting policies below. Historical cost is generally based on the fair value of the consideration given in exchange for assets. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is the Companies Act 2014 and FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" Section 1A, issued by the Financial Reporting Council.

The company qualifies as a small company as defined by section 280A of the Companies Act 2014 in respect of the financial year, and has applied the rules of the 'Small Companies Regime' in accordance with section 280C of the Companies Act 2014 and Section 1A of FRS 102.

headquarters. Incoming resources have been included in the financial statements only when realized or when the ultimate cash realization of which can be assessed with reasonable certainty. Donations in kind are included at their estimated value to the foundation in both revenue and expenditure in the year of receipt. Donated facilities are included at the value to the charity where this can be quantified and a third party is Income represents the total Government Grants receivable in the year ended 31 December 2022 and all donations and grants from other sources received during the period. Income consists of donations and other funds generated by voluntary activities. These are included in the financial statements when received at bearing the cost

Safe Home were awarded a grant of €225,646 under the Government of Ireland Emigrant Support Programme (ESP), covering the period from 1st July 2022 to 30th June 2023. €107,354 of the (ESP) grant is accounted for in the current financial statements for year ended 31st December 2022. A portion the ESP grant received in 2021 €124,256 is also accounted for in the current year.

The ESP income pertaining to the financial year is €225,610. Other income: Private Donations €11,044 (2021: €11,381), The Community Foundation for Ireland €4000 which is treated as deferred income to be allocated in 2023 (2021 €5,000), Mayo County Council €1,500 (2021: €0) and other fundraising income €21,960 (2021: €0)

Government Grants

Grants are credited to deferred revenue. Grants towards capital expenditure are released to the account over the expected useful life of the assets. Grants towards revenue income and expenditure is incurred. expenditure e profit and loss

Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates:

The accounts have been restated to incorporate the impact of a deferred income amount in the grant income received in the comparatives. This adjustment created a current deferred income amount of €114,502. There was no adjustment to previous year's surplus.
